With Rally Day Approaching, Let's Get in Full Swing

Before you know it the summer will be winding down; vacations will be over, kids will be returning to school, Labor Day picnics will be behind us, and it will be Rally Day here at St. Andrew (September 11 this year.) That means that all activities at St. Andrew will be in full swing. Now, as should be obvious, we can't all just SIT ON the swing. A whole bunch of us need to be there to do the pushing -- even better, we could all take turns at pushing the swing.

Since our spring Vision to Action luncheon and through the summer, the Church Council has been synthesizing the results of discussions our members had about the major work areas of the church. While we are still engaged in this process, we have already identified the following focused priorities for our church.

In the area of Church Growth and Outreach:

- Organize follow-up with church visitors and others expressing interest in St. Andrew.
 This includes providing a welcome gift to visitors and initiating member follow-up with thank-you notes, phone calls, and personal visits.
- Establish a church team for consistent and ongoing communication to the community about EVERY church event.
- Maintain a visible presence at community events (already begun this summer with the St. Andrew T-shirts and event attendance).

In the area of Finance and Physical Plant:

 Establish an ongoing St. Andrew "Development Team."

- Build upon previous successful fundraisers.
- Secure leaders and volunteers to serve on a Stewardship Campaign this fall.

In the area of Children and Youth Ministries:

- Expand the team of those willing to assist with Sunday School and other children's activities.
- Establish a leadership team for youth activities.
- Enlist a youth member to serve on Church Council.
- Provide opportunities for youth to attend UMC youth events.
- Provide more opportunities for children and youth to be participants in worship services.

In the area of Worship and Spiritual Growth:

- Develop a larger core of members willing to participate in worship as:
 - ♦ Liturgists
 - ♦ Communion Servers
 - ♦ Musicians
- Build upon possibilities for spiritual growth beyond the worship service, including small groups, classes, creative initiatives (your ideas here!)

We have great ideas here at St. Andrew and a common interest in not only sustaining our church, but growing it and expanding our impact in the community. Church Council meetings are generally attended by 8-12 members, representing a total committee membership of perhaps 25. But with St. Andrew's membership of around 120, and average worship attendance of 60 or more, we definitely need and should have more

folks "pushing the swing." There are many rewards to serving St. Andrew, not the least of which is a stronger sense of connection to a church we love.

So, please, as we enter a new school year I ask:

- What priority or area of service to St. Andrew appeals to YOU?
- Where do you think you might have time or talent to contribute?
- Is there an area you'd like to learn more about?
- Where would you like to grow as part of our Christ-centered faith community?

Bishop's Task Force on Inter-Cultural Competency Training for Community Organizing

Engaging one another in conversation...

How well do we know our diverse neighbors? How do people with different experiences from ours experience this community? What do they value about it? What do they hope for; what do they fear; what concerns them?

Before we can develop an effective multicultural ministry, we must know how to build relationships. We must be sensitive to racial and cultural differences in communication styles. We must respect different perspectives, based, as they are, on different experiences.

On Saturday, September 24, between 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., a group from St. Andrew will attend a pilot training session uniting intercultural competency with community organizing skills. This session is designed to equip church members to deepen relationships with neighbors in the community. So far the contingent from St. Andrew includes Jessie, Jerryelyn, Rev. Regina Davis-Bridges, and Pastor Biel. If this effort, with an eye toward eventually developing some multicultural ministry, sounds like something you could be passionate about, there is room for one more. Please let Pastor Biel know you are interested.

August Mission Project

Those collection boxes in the narthex? They're for our August mission project, a "Special Needs" collection for Respond Now. As you probably know, the government SNAP ("food stamps") program helps only with food items. Non-food items cannot be purchased with the SNAP card. Therefore, we are collecting things like toothbrushes, toothpaste, toilet tissue, deodorant, razors, soap, shampoo, lotion, sanitary napkins for women, laundry detergent, dish detergent, baby wipes, and diapers (sizes 5 and 6 only, please; they have plenty of diapers in the smaller sizes). Thanks for your generous donations!

Please Call Governor Rauner

Ask Governor Rauner to sign Senate Bill 2038, an emergency funding bill for human service programs in Illinois, including those that serve seniors, children, and persons with disabilities. Agencies such as Respond Now, PADS, and Catholic Charities are all affected by the lack of a state budget and can't provide many needed services. So far the Governor has vetoed this bill, which passed the General Assembly with nearly unanimous bipartisan support. The number to call is 217-782-0244.

CROP Hunger Walk Report



The 2016 CROP Hunger Walk netted \$22,976.39. This is better than last year, but not nearly as good as the 2014 Walk when we got \$30,000. The church which raised the most was Trinity Lutheran Church of Park Forest with \$4,091 (16 walkers). Second was Emmaus Community Church of Chicago Heights with \$3,326 (21 walkers). Third was Salem Lutheran of Homewood with \$2,047 (24 walkers). St. Andrew had 5 walkers and raised \$1,379. Thank you to our walkers and thank you to our donors!

This was the 70th anniversary of CROP, and on the CWS website, the Methodist Church is one of the denominations recognized for being involved in CROP Hunger Walks since the very beginning.
