

Reconciling Discernment

On July 31, 2015, a core team from St. Andrew met to begin discussion on the possibility of entering a discernment process. This process, if approved, would engage the entire congregation in holy conversations to consider becoming a Reconciling Congregation of the United Methodist Church. On August 12, the Church Council gave its unanimous approval for the core team to move forward with education, discussion, dialog, discernment, and prayer on this topic.

To be a Reconciling United Methodist church means that the church adopts a public statement which, while inclusive of all families and individuals, specifically welcomes persons of all sexual orientations and gender identities, thus stating our openness and inclusiveness of all of God's children just as they are. It DOES NOT mean that the church would be in conflict with the Church Discipline. Regardless of whether or not we become a reconciling congregation at this time, the prohibitions against pastors performing same-sex unions and the appointment of openly LGBT pastors would govern actual practices of St. Andrew.

It should be noted that our Bishop, Bishop Dyck, is supportive of the Reconciling Ministries Churches in our conference.

The entire discernment process, guided by the "Wesleyan Quadrilateral" of Scripture, Tradition, Reason and Experience, is likely to take around nine months. In the end, the decision to be or not to be a Reconciling Congregation rests with the people of St. Andrew.



United Methodist Women

CROP Hunger Walk

The CROP Hunger Walk will move back to Homewood for the next two years. Salem Lutheran Church will be the new host church. St. Andrew will probably be asked to be one of the rest stops again when the route is developed. The date for 2016 is Sunday, April 24. Mark your calendar.

The ecumenical Steering Committee is in need of someone to create the route and do the signage (with help) that Sunday morning. There needs to be a "long" walk of about 4 miles and a shorter loop of around 2 miles, both with rest stops. This fall when the trees are in full color would be a great time for a couple of people to do some driving around Homewood (starting and ending at Salem Church) to plan the route. Please see Lucy if you wish to do this.

The final results of the 2015 CROP Hunger Walk are now in. The total raised was \$21,804.40. This is down from the \$30,000 that was raised last year. Trinity Lutheran Church of Park Forest was top fund-raiser with a total of \$3,894. Second was Emmaus Community Church of Chicago Heights with a donation of \$2500. Hazel Crest Community UMC was third with \$1,370, **St. Andrew UMC was fourth with \$1334**, and First Christian of Chicago Heights raised \$1315.

Thank you to ALL OF OUR WALKERS, who let their feet speak on behalf of the hungry in our world, and to ALL OF THE DONORS who have sponsored our walkers with their monetary gifts. These gifts will be converted into acts of compassion as food and water are made available in times of disaster anywhere people suffer for want of these basic necessities of life.

Munch and Learn

On World Communion Sunday, October 4, a Munch and Learn is planned for after worship. Our speaker will be Pastor Linda, who has been involved with Kairos Prison Ministry. Three different soups, including a vegan option, will be served along with a dessert. We will be asked to bring bread for World Communion Sunday worship, and any extra bread will be enjoyed with our soups.

Linda was involved at the Dwight women's prison until it closed and now is at the Logan Correctional Center in Dwight where the women were transferred. She has been appointed by Bishop Dyck to plant a United Methodist Church within the walls of the women's prison in Dwight.

The mission of the Kairos Prison Ministry is to share the transforming love and forgiveness of Jesus Christ to impact the hearts and lives of incarcerated men, women and youth, as well as their families, to become loving and productive citizens of their communities.

We will have a free will offering for expenses, with all extra funds going to the prison ministry. Please be generous in your giving.
