he Easter stories, in worship, will turn to conversion stories. The disciples will experience a conversion so that they are no longer spectators but are the church, through which God's saving work will reach multitudes. Peter will experience conversion in his understanding of who is acceptable to God. Gentiles will experience conversion by having the resurrection explained to them by witnesses. Saul will experience the conversion on the Road to Damascus that leads him to abandon his persecution of Christians and become a follower of Jesus Christ.

What conversion is needed in our world? On one hand, individual conversion is an ongoing affair. My own faith and my trust in God is still a work in progress. "Could do better," is stamped all over me. I'm so glad I am not alone in my work towards improvement. I have

the church to help me. I also have Jesus's Holy Spirit. Each time we take communion I am reminded of Jesus's strong and continuing desire to eat and share with us.

Just as individuals need to keep growing in faith, the church is always under construction, or conversion, as well. We have the tasks of freeing people from social evils, forgiveness, proclamation, and teaching interpretation of current events. This looks different today than it did in the past.

If we choose to follow the Holy Spirit, I believe we will find the gospel alive in whatever setting we are led to. The good news can be manifest in every circumstance. Our daily lives are where the scars are visible, where someone's name spoken in love can be truly heard, where our witness makes a difference. Jesus shows up in those moments with grace, healing, mercy, and a call to do better.

Now that Easter has entered our lives once again, I'd like to see us take seriously the conversion of making our everyday lives an offering to God. I'd like to see the law of love realized in our words and actions. I'd like to see God's justice evidenced in our relationship to people and the planet.

This kind of conversion will not be possible with our own resources. Pray for the strength that comes from God to make the necessary changes; to set these bones dancing and melt these stone hearts. Pray that the people of St. Andrew, "The Bringer," church choose to follow the Way, trusting that we are named and blessed. Pray that we, too, may experience a conversion that leads us into deeper trust and an understanding of the world God wants us to build.

Commit yourselves to God and to one another.

Outcome of St. Andrew Reconciling Discernment Process

Since August of 2015, St. Andrew has been engaged in a discernment process to determine whether our church would adopt a Welcome Statement that would set the foundation for formally becoming a Reconciling Congregation of the United Methodist Church. The St. Andrew Reconciling Task Force led this process. During this time, a significant number of the members and friends of St. Andrew participated in informational opportunities and focused discussion groups, provided by the Task Force, in order to understand what it means to be a Reconciling Congregation.

This process culminated in a congregational vote, which took place over three Sundays in March 2016. 59 members of St. Andrew voted in person or through the mail. The ballots were counted this past week. A 95% majority of votes cast were in favor of adopting the Welcome Statement. As a result, St. Andrew will take the next step of adding our name to the list of Reconciling United Methodist churches that are a part of the Reconciling Ministries Network.

(Reconciling Discernment Outcome—cont.)

The Task Force wants to thank everyone who took the time to give this decision such thoughtful consideration. It is clear to us that all members of St. Andrew have a deep affection, love, and care for this church and want to witness the love of Jesus Christ throughout our community. This church has reaffirmed in one more concrete way that ours is a faith community in which everyone can be welcome and where all can experience God's amazing grace and love.

Salad Luncheon, April 30



This involves sweeping and wetmopping the entire area—Fellowship Hall, kitchen and bathrooms, so a little strength and stamina are prerequisites for this job. We also need a couple of volunteers for the 3:00 am shift and a volunteer for the breakfast shift. And we could use a couple of subs for any shift.

Collection of Bottle Caps Resumes

The Western Springs United Methodist Church is now saving bottle caps to acquire a bench, so we can collect them here again. There is a container on the table in the narthex. Lucy will take what we collect to Kathleen when she sees her at Mission U in July, so we have up until then to collect. Plastic caps such as those from milk, juice, water, detergent, and medicine bottles and peanut butter and mayonnaise jars can be used.
