Reconciling Ministries Mini-Fundraiser

Loose Change Offering

The loose change offering that our children will be collecting on May 20 will go toward the Bishop's Appeal, which will help families affected by the Global Migration Crisis. As usual, bills and checks are accepted as well as all your loose change. 75% of the money raised by this appeal will go to the Global Migration Advance for international assistance to refugees and migrants; 25% will stay in Northern Illinois to support organizations like Refugee One and World Relief that work with local immigrant and refugee families. Today, more than 65 million people have been displaced by war, persecution, famine, or natural disaster—the highest number since World War II. By the end of each day, over 28,000 more people begin their own difficult and treacherous journeys in search of safe haven. If you want to contribute but cannot be in church on the 20th, feel free to place your donation in an offering envelope and designate it as Bishop's Appeal.

Annual Mission Challenge



The Mission Challenge for the Annual Conference this June is to collect cleaning bucket supplies. Our Chicago Southern District is being challenged to provide 300 of the following: Clothesline, plastic or cotton, (one 100 ft or two 50 ft), non-spray liquid household cleaner (10 to 20 oz bottle) and dish soap (16 to 28 oz. bottle). St. Andrew will be helping with this challenge. Our goal is to bring 25 of each item as our share of the challenge! Please bring any of these supplies to church by May 20. If you would rather provide a monetary donation, include it in your Sunday offering, labeling the envelope as Mission—Cleaning Bucket Supplies—and a member of your Mission & Social Concerns Committee will shop for you.

The cleaning buckets will be distributed by UMCOR in the U.S. to help those in need after disasters such as floods, hurricanes, and tornadoes.

We are going to be sponsoring, painting and decorating a lawn chair which will be unveiled on June 3 at the Center's Block Party and displayed at Homewood's Artisan Street Fair and around the Village throughout the summer. The chairs will be auctioned in August to benefit the Center. This will give us a chance to have the name and welcome of St. Andrew on display throughout Homewood. Caring for Our Earth

Hurricanes in the Atlantic Ocean have become more intense as the ocean temperatures have risen. The hurricane season now lasts about 20 days longer than it used to. From climate change to microplastics in our food and drinking water, human impact on our environment, and thus our health, is noticeable. So, is there anything we as individuals can do about that? Well, for starters, we can...

Refuse the straw. In 2013, Americans used 500 million drinking straws every day. To understand just how many straws 500 million really is, this would fill over 125 school buses with straws every day. That's 46,400 school buses every year! Americans use these disposable utensils at an average rate of 1.6 straws per person per day.

Most plastic straws, lids, cups, and stirrers provide a few minutes of convenience, little utility, and are disposed of in large quantities—to remain in the environment for 400 years! Refusing these useless plastics is an easy way to cut down on plastic use.

Use a rain barrel to collect water for flowers and lawn. A rain barrel is an easy, accessible way to get on the water-cherishing bandwagon. Use rainwater for your plants and it will replenish groundwater without a detour through the sewer and sewage plant.

(Caring for Our Earth—cont.)

Create a compost heap. Compost is organic material that can be added to soil to help plants grow. Food scraps and yard waste currently make up 20 to 30 percent of what we throw away and should be composted instead. Making compost keeps these materials out of landfills, where they take up space and release methane, a potent greenhouse gas.

When waiting for water to get warm/hot for dishes, collect cold water in an empty one-gallon jug and use it to water indoor plants. Another small step that can add up. Global mismanagement of freshwater resources has created deserts, poisoned land with salt, killed entire lakes—in some cases even making them disappear—and caused unprecedented floods and drought, wiping out entire species. One-third of the world's population lives in countries which are experiencing water shortages, meaning that millions of people are getting thirstier by the minute! (Source: WWF Global)
