You may be accustomed to paying your bills online with your bank's Bill-Pay service. Did you know you can also make a monthly or quarterly contribution to St. Andrew UMC using the same service? It's easy, convenient, and free.

Simply go to your bank's website where you will find information on a variety of options to do this. You may also talk to a representative at your bank to set this up.

If you want to contribute on a regular basis, you can designate an amount and a day when you wish your contribution to be made. One-time contributions can be specified as well.

The bank will notify you, by sending an email to the address you provide, when the contribution is made. You will then enter it into your check register. A check, in the amount you have specified, will then be sent directly to the church. The contribution will be recorded by the Financial Secretary and credited to you in the usual manner of any contribution you make.

This is a simple, convenient, and consistent way of supporting the programs and mission of St. Andrew, and it can be changed or canceled at any time. We sincerely hope you will consider this method. News about the environment



A federal court ruled in August that the EPA must ban a pesticide that poisons farmworkers and causes brain damage in children. The pesticide, a neurotoxin called chlorpyrifos, is used on dozens of crops. The EPA's own scientists had found chlorpyrifos unsafe for children. Before the federal ruling, Hawaii took matters into its own hands, banning the pesticide statewide in June.

The Trump administration announced in August its plan to roll back car pollution standards, and it also challenged the right of states to set their own, stricter standards. The Clean Air Act of 1970 expressly gives California the authority to set emission standards for cars and trucks. If the Administration's proposed rollback stands, cars will pump an additional 120 million metric tons of climate-disrupting pollution into our atmosphere in 2030. The good news is that the 13 states that have adopted the stricter car emissions standards set by California are pushing back to try to protect our air quality.

In New York State's Finger Lakes region, the state's Department of Environmental Conservation denied a controversial underground storage permit for liquefied petroleum gas. The storage project would have allowed 88.2 million gallons of propane to be stored in underground salt caverns along Seneca Lake, the largest of the Finger Lakes. In other areas around the country, gas-storage accidents have caused fires, property damage, injuries, and deaths.

United Methodist Women will have an opportunity to view a free documentary film that relates to their 2017-18 study topic of "Climate Justice." St. Andrew's Committee on Missions and Social Concerns is partnering with the Homewood Science Center to show the film "Before the Flood" [about Climate Change] at 4 p.m. on Sunday, November 4, at the Science Center (in the former Ryan Funeral Home building on Dixie Highway in Homewood). The film is produced by a team from National Geographic and narrated by Leonardo DiCaprio.
